



Sociology Undergraduate Research Grant Competition

2022-23

The Department of Sociology announces a grant competition for undergraduate research. It is available only to sociology majors, and it will award 3 grants of \$500 each. Students will work with a sociology department faculty member. Students can propose their own research or work on a faculty member's ongoing research project. The goal of this program is to give sociology majors practical research experience.

To find a faculty sponsor, you can approach a faculty member with whom you've already worked, whose class you enjoyed, or whose research interests you. Make sure to meet with this faculty member as part of creating your application. If you want help finding a faculty member to work with, let us know.

The proposed research project will be worked on during the 2022-23 school year. If it works for the faculty member, you could also take it as an independent study.

The best applications will have clear discussions of the importance of the issue being studied, the method used to study it, and the student's role in conducting the research.

How do I pick a research project? You'll want to have a general area of research in mind. Beyond that, your faculty member can help you to narrow down the topic and figure out a good way of studying it.
